Grant decisions are based on a number of project factors, including but not limited to job creation, additional payroll, fixed-asset investment commitment, project return on investment, and project location. The program requires job creation and training of employees within a specified period of time and may consider the amount of proceeds per job created and employee trained. JobsOhio may consider providing assistance for eligible projects that improve operational efficiencies or production expansion, along with the retention of jobs. The JobsOhio Workforce Grant term is based upon the project's completion date. The JobsOhio Workforce Grant is reimbursement-based and requires supporting documentation. Work Opportunity Tax Credit	http://fs.ohio.gov/wotc/index.stm	Claim a tax credit for hiring a veteran who has a service-connected disability, is unemployed, or is a member of a family receiving SNAP (food stamp) benefits. Reduce your federal income tax liability by as much as \$9,600 per veteran hired. There is no limit on the number of individuals an employer can hire to qualify to claim the tax credit. Certain tax-exempt organizations can take advantage of WOTC by receiving a credit against the employer's share of Social Security taxes. These two agencies work collaboratively to ensure that local grant recipients receive the technical assistance needed for program implementation and improvement. Will fill a gap in current workforce development programs by providing needed training dollars to Ohio's incumbent workforce through a unique public-private partnership. The ultimate goal of this program is twofold: allow employers to retain and grow their existing Ohio workforce and create a statewide workforce that can meet the present and future demands in an ever changing economy. An eligible employer is one who operates as a for-profit entity in a state-designated targeted industry, with a facility located in Ohio that has been in continuous operation for the 12 months immediately prior to the application submittal. Targeted industries are: Advanced Manufacturing, Aerospace and Aviation, Automotive, BioHealth, Corporate Headquarters, Energy, Financial Services, Food Processing, Information Technology and Services, Polymers and Chemicals, Back Office, Logistics, or Research and Development. The program will be administered on a first-come, first-served basis until all of the available funds are committed. After that time, applications will still be accepted and retained in a "queue" in the event that additional program funds become available.

Job Creation Tax Credit (JCTC)	https://development.ohio.gov/bs/bs_jctc.htm	The Job Creation Tax Credit is a refundable and performance-based tax credit calculated as a percent of created payroll and applied toward the company's commercial activity tax liability. Should the amount of the credit exceed the company's commercial activity tax liability for any given year, the difference is refunded. Companies creating at least 10 jobs (within three years) with a minimum annual payroll of \$660,000 and that pay at least 150 percent of the federal minimum wage are eligible for the credit; however, they must apply for the credit before committing to a project. The Ohio Tax Credit Authority must approve applicants before hiring begins.	Ohio Development Services Agency			The amount of the tax credit can be up to 75% for up to 10 years. The tax credit can exceed 75% only upon recommendation of the Director that there is an extraordinary circumstance that merits an exception. Approved projects generally range between 50% to 60% for 5 to 10 years.
